Produced under the RV Cinemas banner and distributed by Asian Suresh, â??Ariâ?? hit the screens on October 10. Director Jayashankar, known for â??Paper Boyâ??, this time dives deep into the human psyche, exploring the six inner enemies of man â?? the Arishadvargas (Lust, Anger, Greed, Attachment, Pride, and Envy). With a stellar cast featuring Vinod Varma, Anasuya Bharadwaj, and Sai Kumar, this film attempts to blend philosophy, emotion, and human complexity into one thought-provoking cinematic experience.
